Getting into big surf can also be very humbling, but a good lesson in how to work in a dynamic situation, assessing your risk and limits and knowing when to call it a day.

What do you find challenging professionally?

I have worked on a couple of separate matters concerning the unravelling of a complex series of trusts, which were originally established under some quite aggressive and ultimately unreliable schemes promoted by other advisors. That has been quite an eye-opener. However, being able to approach these situations with the benefit of input from our in-house tax and litigation experts, is great.
